Spring is underway! Two of our incubator training farm sites in Dracut are ready for the season thanks to student volunteer groups from Boston College and Phillips Academy Andover! Students from Boston College built an access road with wood chips and cleared an overgrown rock wall creating more space and better work flow for the farm. Phillips Academy students also got their hands dirty and spread wood chips to create a level base for a cold frame that protects farmers' seedlings from the variable spring weather and hungry pests. We are always prepared to welcome new volunteers and community groups to

Our World PEAS Food Hub begins distributing CSA Shares on June 7th. As you already may know, the Food Hub also provides produce to organizations serving low-

income clients to ensure everyone has access to fresh, local produce. To make this work possible, New Entry hosted our annual Fundraising Dinner at <u>Bondir Concord</u> earlier this month. This year we were able to raise **\$19,655** for our food access initiatives! With this contribution, World PEAS will deliver produce throughout the season to over 1,800 low-income individuals in the Greater Boston area. A big **"Thank you"** to attendees, donors, and Bondir Concord for your support! We wouldn't be able to accomplish our work without all of our amazing supporters.

As we get ready to launch into the delicious season filled with locally grown produce, we also start to close out the end of the nonproft "fiscal year." As you start to savor all those local strawberries ripening in the fields, or look forward to tasty, locally grown vine-ripened tomatoes, we appreciate your support to keep those future farmers on the land! Farmland Matching Success - from Zimbabwe to Groton, MA!

It's no news to farmers that finding quality, affordable farmland in Eastern Massachusetts is a battle; however New Entry's Farmland Matching Coordinator, Noelle Fogg, reduces that struggle with one-on-one technical assistance and our robust farmland database. This month, Noelle facilitated a successful land match for a New Entry



graduate! With an unexpected land use termination just days before needing to plant her seedlings, Bessie Tsimba (a 2009 New Entry graduate) was unsure about the fate of her farm for 2016; so she turned to New Entry for help. Noelle and the New Entry team were able to find land and finalize an agreement in almost record time. Bessie, originally from Zimbabwe, is now farming on 3/4 of an acre in Groton, MA. She grows a variety of African crops, which she sells to the local African community and to our own World PEAS CSA!

We are continually adding new parcels to our farmland database- whether you have 2 acres or twenty (or 200!), we'd like to hear from you! USDA National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) Local Food Marketing Practices Survey



We need your help! The USDA recently launched the inaugural Local Food Marketing Practices Survey, the first-ever survey of farmers and ranchers conducted by USDA's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) to produce benchmark data about local food. The Survey confidentially examines the production and marketing of foods produced in 2015 by U.S. farmers and ranchers. Specific attention is given to production

and marketing of local foods directly to consumers and to retailers that sell to consumers.

The initial deadline has passed but there is still time for producers to respond by filling out the survey online at www.agcounts.usda.gov, or returning the form by mail. NASS will also send another mailing this month as a reminder to those who have not completed their survey. National Incubator Farm Training Initiative (NIFTI),


provides comprehensive consulting, educational resources, and professional development opportunities for scores of organizations throughout North America. Most recently, NIFTI began facilitating regional meetings between

Farmer Profile: Karl Goethert and Elena Colman



Karl Goethert and Elena Colman got to know each other as farmhands on the historic Brigham Farm in Concord, MA. Neither came from farming backgrounds, but found that the work suited them well. In 2011, they decided to branch out. Brigham Farm agreed to rent them a portion of their land so Karl and Elena could dabble in growing lettuce, carrots and radishes, and Crooked Row Fields was born. Their business continued to grow and they sold their produce through the same markets that Brigham Farm attended, and at the Brigham Farm farmstand.

Karl had an idea how to grow vegetables, but wanted to gain some solid skills in business planning. He signed up for New Entry's Farm Business Planning course. He says that he understood most of the course's concepts, but until going through the class, hadn't understood how to wrap it all up into a workable business plan. The biggest benefit he took away after graduating from the course in January 2011 was that it allowed him to write a business proposal for which he was awarded a grant that provided enough funding to get their business started for the 2011 season.

Karl and Elena find that they learn best "on the fly," and their business strategy changes a little bit each year. Their operation has expanded to a mixed variety of specialty crops and cut flowers. This year, their produce will go exclusively to their CSA subscribers, and they plan to offer a summer share to their members for the first time.
